Frequency with which Teachers Report Losing Planning

Georgia's substitute teacher shortage intensifies teacher planning time insufficiency, as teachers must often cover colleague's classes when substitutes are unavailable.

State funding to cover the cost of substitutes has not increased **since 1985** and remains well below what districts must spend to attract substitutes.

More than **80%** of teachers report losing their planning period at least a once a month. Nearly **two-thirds** lose it once a week or more.

Planning time is vital to teachers' ability to serve students, and lost planning may further exacerbate teacher burnout.

- Increase state funding for substitute teachers
